



Dia de los Muertos is traditionally celebrated in all parts of the republic of Mexico on the eve of All Saints Day, the second of November. It is on this occasion when most catholics, and particularly the indigenous populations, remember the souls of the dearly departed by preparing "ofrendas", offerings of food. In most cases it's the women of the family of "los muertos" who take a leading role in preparing the favorite dishes of those who have died, buying the fruits and flowers of the season and artistically arranging them on tables or altars. Pictures of saints and candles are also often included amongst personal artifacts or photographs of the departed souls.

In some communities, especially in the states of Michoacan and Oaxaca, women and children even to the present day take baskets of food or other offerings to the cemeteries on the eve of all saints day, there they decorate the graves with candles and the yellow flower of the dead (*zempaxuchil* in native nahualt) and await in vigil amidst the flickering candle lights, in the belief that the spirits of the dead will come and feast on the offerings of the living.

This year's *Dia de los Muertos* exhibition focuses on *exvotos* (votive offerings) and *ofrendas*, and the importance of this custom in the spiritual and cultural life of the community.

Because women play a major role in the manifestation of this tradition the exhibition gives prominence to *the woman's point of view*.
