BRODY ARTS FUND GIVES \$100,000 IN MINORITY AID

he Brody Arts Fund, the first endowment created to help emerging and minority arts organizations and individual artists in Southern California, has just awarded \$100,000 in its first round of grants.

Small to mid-size groups ranging from the East West Players, receiving \$5,000, to the Teatro de los Puppets, awarded \$1,000, will benefit from the money given the fund last spring by the Expansion Arts Program of the National Endowment for the Arts. (The endowment defines expansion arts as "minority, inner-city, rural and tribal (Native American) arts.")

The Brody fund received the largest of seven seed grants from the endowment through its Community Foundations Initiative after the late Sidney F. Brody, a Los Angeles businessman and arts patron, proposed in 1982 that funding structures for new arts groups and artists be established within the community foundations of major American cities. The fund operates within the California Community Foundation, a nonprofit umbrella organization for about 190 small foundations.

In all, 34 arts organizations, including dance, music, theater and visual arts groups, were awarded a total of \$72,500 in three categories. and 12 visual artists received a total of \$27,500.

After receiving 433 requests for about \$500,000, "We learned that there is vastly more activity in the minority arts community than anyone guessed," said Jack Shakely, the California Community Foundation's executive director.

Shakely said grantees were chosen by the Brody advisory board, made up of community, artist and arts agency representatives, and other arts experts not on the board. Grants were based less on need than on "artistic excellence, community involvement" and, with the arts groups, "administrative strength."


City Hearts Performing Arts, a program that provides free dance and creative movement classes to children living on Skid Row, received \$500 from the fund.

Shari Basch-Wexler, City Heart's director, said her 10month-old program serves a multi-ethnic group of about 100 children a week.

"We'll use the money for surviving. Just surviving," said Basch-Wexler. "It will also help us get other grants. The first one is always the hardest to get. And for us and others, this is a stamp of approval which says, 'Hey you other (funding) people, Brody did it, now you must follow" in supporting the emerging arts community.

In the next three years, the Brody fund will award another \$300,000 that it will receive from the endowment's Expansion Arts Program. The money must be matched 2 to 1 by private gifts being solicited by the California Community Foundation to create a permanent endowment.
