

Latino artists will have works exhibited

Eight local Latino artists will be counted with 22 of their contemporaries representing the Asian, Black and Jewish communities in "Fusion '85" exhibit opening on Sunday, Sept. 8, in the Jewish Community Building Galleries, 6505 Wilshire Blvd., Los Angeles, with a public reception, 3-5 p.m.

Los Angeles Mayor Tom Bradley, Deputy Mayor Grace Davis and City Councilmen John Farrell, Mike Woo and Zev Yaroslavsky will be on hand to share in the festivities saluting artists Michael M. Amescua, Isabel Castro, East Los Streetscapers Wayne Alaniz Healy, George Yepes, David Rivas Botello; plus Frank Romero, Luis Serrano and Linda Vallejo, among others.

The exhibition is sponsored by the Art Committee of Jewish Federation Council of Greater Los Angeles. JFC is the umbrella organization of some 500 Jewish community group representing a full spectrum of Jewish concerns, including cultural, educa-
