If the art is to be picked up by the university, the forms must be completed and returned to our agent upon receiving your work. This form is for insurance purposes to safeguard your art.

Moreover, if you desire to sell your work, please provide us with a price list, which we can keep on file for those wanting to purchase your art. Also, upon request, we will add your mailing list to our general notification file or supply you with notices which you can disseminate at your discretion. Our brochure should be ready for circulation by January 13, 1986.
